Freezing to Death

It's a frigid Saturday afternoon in February with two inches of fresh snow on the ground. Joppa winter heat team volunteers stand by their pickup truck, near a homeless camp, trying to stomp feeling into their feet. Their fingers are stiffening in their ski gloves, so they stuff their hands in their pockets or tuck them high under their armpits. A gust of wind, sharp and cutting, makes them hunch their shoulders and duck deeper into their coat collars.

"I can't imagine living outside," says Joppa volunteer and videographer, Adam Beecher. "Sometimes I think it's cold in my home, but then I think how tough the homeless have it. It boggles my mind."

Around the Metro, more than 100 homeless people are living in tents, shacks, and vehicles every day during this brutal winter.

"If it wasn't for these guys bringing me a heater and fuel, I would have been dead somewhere, frozen to death," says Ken, a homeless man. "I don't like shelters. I'm a vet (with) Post Traumatic Stress Disorder—don't like to be around people." Ken lives in a structure that's little more than a windbreak and sometimes jogs just to raise his body temperature.

At another camp Eric ran out of fuel the night before. "It ain't very comfortable when you can see your breath inside the tent. Without Joppa's heaters there would be a lot of sick people," he says. "To stay warm, you have to go downtown, hang out in the library or something, but that's quite a ways from here."

"I don't know what else these people could do if it wasn't for the heaters," says volunteer, Frank Green. "We deliver 40 or 50 tanks a week, but it's expensive, \$400 to \$500 a week." Since then, propane prices have more than doubled!

If it wasn't for these guys bringing me a heater and fuel, I would have been dead somewhere, frozen to death. —Bill On this trip the team found four new campers, people who had timed out of shelters or fallen on hard times. On most trips, throughout the winter, volunteers find new homeless people.

Frank finds bringing heat

to people very rewarding. "We go into a camp and call, 'Joppa's here with propane,' and you'll hear them cheering inside the tent."

"They're really decent people who have just fallen on hard times or made bad decisions. We come out to give them a hug, pray with them and show them God's love. If you want to get plugged in and do something to serve people and to serve God, try Joppa. There are lots of ways to volunteer, to help."

The sun is getting low as team members skid down the hill to Don's camp. They'll have to use the rope to climb back up to the pickup. Roy, who's living under a nearby bridge, hails the camp and comes in to ask for a heater:

"You know, they found Bill dead today," he tells them. "Over there, under the bridge. Bill had a room at the shelter, but came here to drink beer and ended up freezing to death." Roy pauses, "You can't help but think about dying like that, living outside. And the hardest part: a lot of people just don't care."

YOUR DONATIONS AND VOLUNTEERING SAVE LIVES

Kristen Petty and members of the Prairie Ridge Church youth group volunteer one Sunday a month, and Van's apartment is one of their stops. They knock on his window of his secure building and he lets them in. But, that Sunday, when Elijah Petty, Libby Bulver and Mason Van De Pol were on outreach, he didn't answer. "I was about to leave when one of the kids heard someone say, "I can't get up." When another resident let them in, they found Van with a gangrene-infected leg. It was amputated a few hours later after he was admitted to the hospital. "They said he wouldn't have made it through another night," Kristen says.





Dying Homeless...Alone & Forgotten

Dying homeless frequently means dying alone and forgotten. Having lost touch with relatives, family members often never know what fate became of those they once loved.

The n ames of people who died homeless in lowa were read December 21st at a somber candlelight vigil. Gathered at the foot of the Capitol in the shivering cold on the first day of winter—the longest night of the year—the crowd paid tribute to those that died and listened to Mayor Cownie pledging to work to end the causes of homelessness.

Joppa also received proclamations from Governor Branstad and Mayor Cownie declaring it National Homeless Persons' Memorial Day in the State of Iowa and City of Des Moines.

Since there is no formal registry of homeless deaths in Iowa, Joppa compiles the list each year from homeless people, shelters and other sources. Several of those remembered had no known last name. We know that many others have died unnoticed.

WINTER SURVIVAL

Heater Fuel Costs Skyrocket

Tonight, more than 100 people will sleep outside in the cold, sheltered only by tents, lean-tos, and shacks. Although Joppa has helped 158 homeless people get off the streets since 2008, those outside tonight have no immediate options for housing, so they will shiver and struggle to stay dry and warm.

Two Joppa volunteers, Frank Green and Barry Green (no relation), have led the winter heat teams that deliver Mr: Heater "Portable Buddy" heaters to homeless campers, then supply one or two 20-pound tanks of propane each week as needed.

The heaters are specifically designed to use in tents, shacks and other temporary structures. They're rated safe for indoor use and have many safety features including automatic shut off if the heater encounters low oxygen or tips over. Then, with propane deliveries each week, the team brings unconditional love and friendship, and ensures heaters are working properly.

The problem is this winter started much earlier than usual and has been colder than normal. Propane prices have skyrocketed because of demand. As of this writing, costs have tripled and are expected to continue climbing until demand subsides.Watch Joppa news story on ABCTV-5 here:

FOUNDERS' VISION

Each winter about 700 homeless people freeze to death, according to the National Coalition for the Homeless. Many of those die here in the Midwest.

During the winter of 2008, Matt Clark froze to death behind the Colonial Bakery in Des Moines. In his mid forties, Matt was too young to die.

Jack Stone froze to death while sleeping in a dumpster behind the library and was crushed the next morning. Dave Sheldon was found frozen to death in a parking garage. Carl Jefferson and Jack Wagner also died of hypothermia here in Des Moines.

This is why the Joppa winter survival heat program is so critical...it helps the homeless people in our community survive until they can get back into housing.
