Homeless, Helpful & Hopeful

According to Rhonda Alberts, all social networks are not created equal. While most associate the words social network with online communication platforms that is not necessarily the case for homeless populations. "For us, social networking basically means word of mouth," Rhonda explains. It was social networking in the form of word of mouth that led Rhonda to Joppa.

Rhonda became homeless due to a series of unfortunate events which ultimately led to a substance abuse situation. While traveling through lowa her truck broke down. Due to a lack of resources to obtain needed repairs she sought temporary refuge at a local shelter. Later, as a result of networking with others temporarily residing at the shelter - she found refuge under a bridge with a community of homeless persons. "I relied on these folks," Rhonda explains, "through word of mouth I learned where to obtain food, water and other supplies I needed to survive."

Shortly after relocating, she contracted a severe case of bronchitis and through her newly established social network learned about the services of Joppa. After Rhonda was treated at a local hospital, Joppa volunteers assisted

WINTER SURVIVAL SHELTERS

- Temporary Winter Shelter Packages for those with no immediate options for housing or other shelter
- Includes tent, rain fly, tarp, sleeping bag, blankets & pillow

HEATER SYSTEMS

- Heat for those without immediate housing options
- Safe for indoor-use in tents, cabins & wooden structures
- Includes heater, three 20-lb propane tanks and a hose
 - a) Ten Heater Systems.....\$1,250

 - c) One Heater System.....\$125

HEATER FUEL

- Weekly delivery of propane fuel for heater systems
- A 20-lb tank provides one week of heat average per dwelling
- Each person receives an extra tank of fuel as a backup
 - a) Ten people for one month.....\$600
 - b) Five people for one month.....\$300
 - c) One person for one month.....\$60

WINTER BOOTS

- Waterproof boots to help prevent frostbite and trench foot
- To survive, homeless people often walk 10-20 miles per day to sources of food, work and other resources.
 - a) Ten pairs of boots.....\$900 b) Five pairs of boots.....\$450 c) One pair of boots.....\$90

her in getting established with a tent and provided much-needed heat and other supplies throughout and beyond her recovery.

"I have traveled all over the United States," explains Rhonda, "What I know is that the world needs more Joppas. When I most needed assistance, they gave me a hand up, you won't find that in too many other places. I'll never forget that." Rhonda, also known as "Mom" by her peers, continues to pay that kindness forward by giving a hand up to those with urgent and immediate

Rhonda uses her networking skills by taking her knowledge of available homeless resources to the streets, communicating those lifelines to those in situations similar to hers. Rhonda

believes that helping others is one of the best ways to cope with overcoming her own obstacles and addictive behaviors. "When I am helping others, I am not thinking about my own demons," Rhonda explains. "You don't need a lot of possessions to lend a hand. The only possession you need is the ability to talk, and I definitely have that," Rhonda quips.

Rhonda explains that by providing a hand up in the form of shelter and much-needed heat during the sometimes brutal lowa winters, Joppa isn't enabling, they are empowering. "I have goals now, Rhonda explains, "I'm working on getting an apartment." Ultimately, Rhonda would like to use her excellent communication skills to write a book concerning the plight of the homeless in America. "I've lived in a lot of places and the homeless are not treated the same in different parts of the United States. I'd like to tell that story," Rhonda explains. "I'll tell you one thing," Rhonda offers, " Iowa Nice is a real thing and the help Joppa offers is proof."

REMEMBERING THOSE WHO DIED HOMELESS IN 2019

"Dying homeless, typically means dying alone and forgotten," explains loe Stevens, loppa Cofounder & Chairman. "Too often, people experiencing homelessness lose touch with family and friends, who don't even know they've died, and for the vast majority there is no memorial service."

Joppa organizes the Iowa Homeless Memorial at the capitol each year on the first day of winter and longest night of the year, to remember those who've died homeless, to honor them as fellow human beings, and to help prevent future homeless deaths by expanding awareness.

Although unseasonably warm, the chill dipped near freezing as the names of over 40 individuals were read by Angie Arthur of the Polk County Continuum of Care and Matt McNeese of Lutheran Church of Hope.

The deceased were honored by over 250 attendees, proclamation readings by Governor Kim Reynolds and Mayor Frank Cownie, music by Joe Figueroa, harmonica,

and The Chamber Choir from Heartland Youth Choir, Poetry by Claudine Cheatom, and Pastoral Prayer and Reflection by Rev. Rechab Gray of Cottage Grove Church.
