Women Facing Homelessness

Out of more than half a million homeless people in this country, an estimated 39% are women and girls, and that percentage is growing.

This increase has occurred as the pandemic exacerbated the conditions and situations that cause homelessness among women, such as domestic abuse and a lack of affordable housing.

When women become homeless, they face a more difficult battle for survival than men. The most severe and continuous threat is physical and sexual violence.

Kristin, a 27-year-old homeless woman in Des Moines, says it's hard to find places to stay to get off the street because it's usually men she knows who offer their apartments, but always for a price: "They don't want money. They want to have sex. And when I say 'no,' it's 'put out or get out' pretty much."

Kristin was forced to move her tent to an isolated wooded area to avoid predators. "Being out here by myself as a woman is probably the scariest thing ever," she says. "It's not safe. You don't know who's out here, or a tree could fall on you. I sleep with an ax in my hand and pepper spray right next to me, and I only sleep a few hours a night."

Women Facing Homelessness, CONTINUED

Often the best way homeless women find protection is by forming a relationship with a man. Before he took his own life in February of 2021, Kristin's late boyfriend stayed up nights to protect her, but she says he also beat her and mistreated her. "It wasn't the healthiest relationship, but he was still the only person I had."

Homeless women also struggle with high rates of mental, physical, and sexual health problems, with many obstacles in getting the assistance they need.² "You don't have bus fare, so it's hard to keep appointments. If you have to walk 14

> miles [to get help], then you're not going to go," says Kristin.

Women can find it harder to escape homelessness, but not just because of violence and health problems. They're hired for lowerpaying jobs than men and have difficulty staying clean to keep

employment. Feminine hygiene products are expensive and hard to get, and maintaining a clean wardrobe is nearly impossible. "[The hard part is] getting a shower and feeling like a normal person to go in there and work and not feel embarrassed or weird," says Kristin.

Despite living homeless for years, Kristin finally sees herself on a better path with the assistance of Joppa volunteers who've cared about her. One day she hopes to mentor other women after she transitions out of homelessness. "I want to be able to get down on their level and show them that I've come up from it and let them know that you can get out of it."

Joppa brought city and county leaders together to form the Joppa Village Coalition, which started meeting monthly in December 2020. All members committed to a charter with three objectives:

- I) Identify suitable properties for the village
- 2) Gain requisite approvals for land use
- 3) Support fundraising, village groundbreaking, and ribbon-cutting

MISSION: Establish a gated village community to transition Polk County citizens out of homelessness.

VISION: A safe and supportive community that successfully transitions people from living under bridges, in tents and vehicles, and on the streets into permanent housing and stable, productive lives.

The Joppa Village: A Community of Support

Moving another step toward building lowa's first tiny home village, we formed the Joppa Village Coalition in December 2020 and enlisted the help of county and city leaders, including Des Moines Mayor Frank Cownie as co-chair.

This group worked diligently to narrow a long list of properties for the village down to the best choice: a former wastewater treatment site at 1661 County Line Road between Fleur and SW Ninth Street. We are in the process of purchasing the 21-acre property with the help of a generous donor, stepping us even closer to making the village a reality.

Several highly respected professionals partnered with Joppa to create a comprehensive plan for the Joppa Village, which will be a safe, supportive community that helps people transition from homelessness into permanent housing.

"People desperately need a supportive community to be lifted out of homelessness," says Joppa Housing Program Manager Curt Carlson. "This village is designed to provide the peer support and cheerleading they need to become the best versions of themselves." He says people placed in housing without a network of helpful neighbors and friends can end up feeling isolated. Too often, they move back to homeless camps to be near

people they know because loneliness can feel even worse than living unsheltered.

The goal of the Joppa Village is to prevent isolation and regression back into homelessness by bringing people together through cooperative living. Each resident will play a role in maintaining the village, and all will have access to job training, medical care, and shared spaces, including a large kitchen and other amenities in the village community buildings. In addition, the village will be gated to keep residents safe, and everyone will be held accountable for following community guidelines.

"Ideally, this will be a neighborhood trying to give back," says Ed Binkley, Associate Director of Design at BSB Design. "The big picture is a self-sustaining community intended for residents to build each other up."

First Loft Cottage Build by Strategic America

Inspired by a previous Joppa Tiny Home build by Drake students, Michelle Thornton, Director of Client Strategy & Services at Strategic America (SA), challenged her coworkers to join her in a build of their own. "I thought, "If we can help people get off the ground and into a home, that would make such an impact on their lives, and it would give us a chance to work alongside each other for something bigger than any one of us."

Michelle and her coworkers raised the funds for the build, but due to some logistical delays and then COVID-19, the project was sidelined. Finally, nearly 30 SA volunteers came together in the company parking lot to build the first Joppa Loft Cottage prototype in September. BSB Design created this new "loft" concept for the Joppa Tiny Home Village to improve safety during pandemics. The new prototype now includes a full bathroom, kitchen and other amenities for an even better living environment.

To encourage the spirit of giving back, SA gives every employee two paid volunteer days a year. "It's rewarding for them and for all of us who contribute to positive change in our communities," says Strategic America CEO John Schreurs. "Joppa's mission of helping homeless people not only survive, but rebuild their lives, is one example of that work toward positive change."
